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BUILD THE CHURCH IN HOLINESS

Day 1 - October 14

Christ the Builder

Matthew 16:18 And I say also unto thee, That thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it.

Devotional Thought:

As we begin these forty days of consecration, we must remember that the Church is not built on men, programs, or traditions but on Christ Himself. Jesus is the Master Builder, and He alone has the authority and power to establish His Church. From our humble beginnings in the early 20th century until today, the Apostolic Assembly has survived challenges, opposition, and trials because the foundation has always been Christ.

Notice that Jesus promises that the 'gates of hell shall not prevail' against the Church. Gates represent authority and power. The powers of darkness cannot overcome what Jesus Himself has built. As we prepare for the centennial celebration, we can look back with gratitude—100 years of faithful testimony prove that His promise is true.

But this verse is not only about protection from attack; it is also about victory and advancement. The Church is not on the defensive—it is moving forward, storming the gates of hell through evangelism, missions in holiness. As we enter a new century of ministry, we must embrace the call to build with Him, not in our own wisdom, but in His strength and plan.





Day 2 - October 15

A Call to Holiness

1 Peter 1:16 Because it is written, Be ye holy; for I am holy.

Devotional Thought:

Holiness is the very character of God. When Peter repeats the Old Testament command, 'Be ye holy; for I am holy,' he is reminding us that holiness is not optional for God's people—it is essential. Holiness is both separation from sin and dedication to God.

As an Apostolic Pentecostal movement, our identity has always been rooted in holiness. Our pioneers knew that the power of the Holy Spirit must be matched by a life consecrated to God. Without holiness, there is no true revival; without holiness, there is no spiritual authority.

Holiness is not just about outward appearance—it begins in the heart. God calls us to purity of thought, word, and deed. Our worship, our preaching, and our fellowship must reflect the character of our holy God. As we prepare for this historic convention, let us renew our commitment to personal and corporate holiness, so that the fire of God may burn brightly among us.







Day 3 - October 16

Unless the Lord Builds

Psalm 127:1 Except the LORD build the house, they labour in vain that build it: except the LORD keep the city, the watchman waketh but in vain.

Devotional Thought:

The psalmist reminds us of a profound truth: human effort without God's blessing is vanity. We can plan, organize, and labor tirelessly, but if the Lord is not the Builder, our work will not endure.

The Apostolic Assembly has seen a century of growth not because of human ingenuity but because God has been at work. Our pastors, leaders, and members have labored faithfully, but the true Builder has always been the Lord. As we anticipate this convention, we must again place every service, every program, and every decision into His hands.

This verse also speaks of God as the Keeper of the city. Our strength cannot protect us from every danger, but His watchful care is unfailing. As we seek to build the Church in holiness, we must trust His protection and guidance, knowing that He alone can secure the future of the Apostolic Assembly.







Day 4 - October 17

By My Spirit

Zechariah 4:6 "Then he answered and spake unto me, saying, This is the word of the LORD unto Zerubbabel, saying, Not by might, nor by power, but by my spirit, saith the LORD of hosts."

Devotional Thought:

When the exiles returned to Jerusalem to rebuild the temple, the task seemed overwhelming. Resources were limited, opposition was fierce, and human strength was insufficient. Yet God gave Zerubbabel a promise: the work would not be accomplished by human effort, but by the Spirit of the Lord.

The Apostolic Assembly has reached one hundred years not because of human brilliance or strength but because of the Spirit's guidance and power. Every revival, every healing, every soul baptized in Jesus' Name is evidence of God's Spirit at work among us.

As we prepare for the next century, we must remember that our programs and strategies cannot replace the power of the Holy Ghost. If we desire true revival, it must come through prayer, fasting, and complete dependence on the Spirit of God.







Day 5 - October 18

Sanctify Yourselves

Joshua 3:5 "And Joshua said unto the people, Sanctify yourselves: formorrow the LORD will do wonders among you."

Devotional Thought:

Before Israel crossed the Jordan into the Promised Land, Joshua gave them an important command: "Sanctify yourselves." God's wonders would not happen apart from the people's consecration. Holiness always precedes victory.

In the same way, as we look toward our convention, God is calling us to prepare our hearts. Consecration is more than avoiding sin—it is setting ourselves apart completely for His service. When God's people sanctify themselves, the stage is set for His power to be revealed.

Let us approach these forty days as Israel did: with expectation. Tomorrow the Lord will do wonders among us, but today He calls us to holiness.







Day 6 - October 19

Power to Witness

Acts 1:8 "But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth."

Devotional Thought:

The purpose of Pentecost was not merely personal blessing but global mission. The Holy Ghost equips believers to be witnesses of Jesus Christ everywhere they go. From Jerusalem to the uttermost parts of the earth, the Spirit empowers the Church to spread the gospel.

As an Apostolic Pentecostal people, we are heirs of this promise. For 100 years, the Apostolic Assembly has proclaimed the Name of Jesus with power. But the mission is not finished. God calls us to reach new cities, nations, and generations with the same Pentecostal fire.

During these forty days, let us pray that God will once again baptize us with power from on high—power to preach, power to witness, and power to build the Church in holiness.







Day 7 - October 20

Unity in the Spirit

Ephesians 4:3 "Endeavouring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace."

Devotional Thought:

Unity is not automatic; it must be pursued and preserved. Paul urges the Church to "endeavour"—to make every effort—to keep the unity of the Spirit. This unity is not based on human agreement alone but is the work of the Holy Ghost binding believers together in peace.

As we approach the centennial, we must value unity as one of our greatest strengths. Division weakens the witness of the Church, but unity multiplies its power. The Apostolic Assembly has been preserved through one hundred years because God has bound us together in His Spirit.

Building the Church in holiness requires us to guard against pride, bitterness, and strife. We must forgive, reconcile, and love one another so that the Spirit of God can move freely among us.







Day 8 - October 21

Living Stones

1 Peter 2:5 "Ye also, as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house, an holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ."

Devotional Thought:

The Church is not made of brick and mortar but of people redeemed by Christ. Each believer is a "lively stone" that God is shaping and setting into place. Together we form a spiritual house where God's presence dwells.

Our centennial reminds us that the Apostolic Assembly has been built by countless believers who offered their lives as living stones for God's house. Pastors, missionaries, families, and pioneers—all were shaped by the hand of God and set into His great building project.

Today, God calls us to continue offering ourselves as living sacrifices. When we live holy lives, we strengthen the foundation of the Church and create a dwelling place for His glory.







Day 9 - October 22

Pray for Laborers

Matthew 9:38 "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest."

Devotional Thought:

Jesus saw the multitudes and was moved with compassion because they were weary and scattered. His response was not only to preach but to instruct His disciples to pray for laborers. The harvest is great, but the workers are few.

The Apostolic Assembly cannot be content with celebrating its past. We must pray for a new generation of pastors, evangelists, teachers, and missionaries who will reap the harvest in this century. The mission field is vast—our prayer must be, "Lord, send forth laborers."

Every believer has a role in the harvest. Some go, some send, some intercede, but all must participate. Let us use these forty days to pray earnestly for God to raise up workers for His fields.







Day 10 - October 23

Steadfast in Doctrine

Acts 2:42 "And they continued stedfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers."

Devotional Thought:

The early Church grew in power and unity because they were steadfast in the Apostles' doctrine. This was not casual interest but unwavering commitment to the truth revealed by Christ through His apostles. Doctrine anchored them, fellowship strengthened them, and prayer empowered them.

For one hundred years, the Apostolic Assembly has held firmly to the Apostolic message—repentance, baptism in Jesus' Name, and the infilling of the Holy Ghost. This truth is our identity and our heritage. To abandon it would be to lose the very foundation of who we are.

As we consecrate ourselves for the convention, let us reaffirm our steadfast commitment to Apostolic doctrine. It is this truth that sanctifies us, unites us, and propels us into a new century of holiness and revival.







Day 11 - October 24

The Glory of the Lord

2 Chronicles 7:1 "Now when Solomon had made an end of praying, the fire came down from heaven, and consumed the burnt offering and the sacrifices; and the glory of the LORD filled the house."

Devotional Thought:

When Solomon dedicated the temple, God responded with visible glory. Fire from heaven consumed the sacrifice, and His presence filled the house. What made that day unforgettable was not the beauty of the temple but the glory of God that rested upon it.

As we prepare for the centennial convention, our greatest desire must be that the glory of the Lord fill the house. Without His presence, even the most beautiful programs are empty. But when His glory comes down, lives are transformed, healings occur, and hearts are renewed.

The Apostolic Assembly began with humble meetings in homes and storefronts, yet the glory of God was present. Let us seek the same outpouring now. May every service during this consecration and convention be marked by the manifest presence of God.







Day 12 - October 25

Be Strong and Courageous

Joshua 1:9 "Have not I commanded thee? Be strong and of a good courage; be not afraid, neither be thou dismayed: for the LORD thy God is with thee whithersoever thou goest."

Devotional Thought:

As Joshua prepared to lead Israel into the Promised Land, God gave him repeated commands to be strong and courageous. Leadership requires courage, especially when facing opposition and uncertainty.

Our pioneers displayed this courage when they preached baptism in Jesus' Name and the infilling of the Holy Ghost, even when it cost them friendships, security, and reputation. They stood strong because they knew God was with them.

The same call comes to us today. As the Apostolic Assembly enters a new century, we must lead with boldness, knowing that God's presence goes before us. Fear must not paralyze us —courage, rooted in His promise, will carry us forward.







Day 13 - October 26

Galatians 6:9 "And let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not."

Devotional Thought:

Ministry can be exhausting. The Apostle Paul encourages believers not to lose heart, for harvest is promised to those who persist. Weariness is real, but so is God's reward.

Day 14 - October 27

Day 17 - October 30

Day 23 - November 5

Day 30 - November 12

Acts 2:4" And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance."

Devotional Thought:

Pentecost was not a one-time event but the birth of a Spirit-filled Church. The early believers were all filled, and that same promise remains today.

For 100 years, the Apostolic Assembly has been marked by Pentecostal fire. This is our identity: we are a Spirit-filled people. Without the Holy Ghost, we are powerless; with Him, we are unstoppable.
